TUCKSHOP – CAFÉ CHANEL STUDENTS CAN NOW USE THEIR ID CARDS FOR PAYMENTS

Students can now conveniently pay with their ID cards instead of using cash or card. To transfer money to your child's ID card, which can then be scanned at the tuckshop at the point of purchase, simply follow the link in your Parent Orbit App. Navigate to the side menu under Café Chanel.

Additionally, pre-orders can now be made online

through the app. Pre-ordering saves students time waiting in the tuckshop line and ensures they do not miss out. The cutoff time for online ordering is 8:30 AM from Monday to Thursday and 8:00 AM on Friday. We encourage ordering ahead for the week, especially for Fridays. Orders can be canceled at any time up until the cut-off time.

Assessment Reminders

Chanel College upholds high standards for both academic integrity and active student participation in learning and assessments. Students are expected to perform all learning and assessment tasks to the best of their abilities to reach their highest academic potential. This expectation includes meeting all subject and assessment deadlines on or before the due date. The College's practices align with guidelines set by the Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority (QCAA).

The Senior Years and Middle Years Assessment Policies are available on the Parent Orbit App, Parent Lounge and Student Café. I encourage all Middle Years (Years 7-9) Senior Years (Years 10-12) parents and students to read the document.

The following are reminders:

Assignments

- Students must submit assignments **on or before the due date and time**, regardless of attendance at school on the due date. The time for assessment to be due is 3.10pm unless submission is required in a lesson.
- If no submission is made by the due date and time, any previously submitted evidence will be marked (draft, research book, checkpoint evidence).

Examinations

- No student can complete an examination prior to the scheduled day and time or before the rest of the cohort, as this compromises the security and integrity of the examination.
- If a student is absent from an examination for non-medical reasons (for example, travel during term time, concerts, holidays, family gatherings), the examination will be forfeited, and the student will receive a No Result (NR) for the assessment.

When a student is unwell on the day of an examination, parents are to contact the College by 8.30am. A Variations to Assessment (Year 7-10) or AARA (Years 11 & 12) form needs to be submitted with the appropriate evidence. These forms are available on the Parent Orbit app and Parent Lounge.

The assessment weeks are indicated in the College calendar to assist families with planning ahead. If you have any questions, please contact the College.

DID YOU KNOW?

Just 4 days off this term means your attendance rate for the term is only 92%!

Students will require an attendance rate above 85% to represent the College in sporting, cultural and co-curricular events and also to attend the Year 12 Celebration Dinner.

Students with an attendance rate above 95% are increasing their chances of getting better marks. Make sure you're not missing out.

FROM OUR DEANS

As we continue to prioritise the educational journey of our students, we would like to address a matter of importance: student attendance and the process for requesting extended absences. We understand that family circumstances can sometimes necessitate students taking leave during the school term. However, we want to remind all of the importance of regular school attendance and the procedures in place for requesting extended absences.

The Importance of Regular Attendance

In Queensland, it is a legal requirement for parents of children of compulsory school age to ensure their child is enrolled and attending school. Regular attendance is vital for your child's academic and social development. It allows children to fully participate in and benefit from the educational opportunities provided at Chanel College. This includes

Attendance at all examinations and organised College events such as sporting carnivals, retreats, Chanel Day celebrations, Awards ceremonies, and Masses.

Impact of Absences During Census Periods

We would like to draw your attention to the impact of absences during State and Federal Census eligibility periods (January/February & July/August). Funding for your child's education is provided by the Commonwealth and State governments based on student attendance during these periods. Taking leave during these times significantly reduces the funding received by the College. This substantial loss of funding can have a direct impact on the resources available to support your child's education and may indirectly affect school fees.

Requesting an Extended Absence

To formally request an extended absence, please complete the Chanel College Notice of Extended Absence from Compulsory Schooling Form. This form can be downloaded from the Parent Orbit App or Parent Lounge. Please submit the completed form to the Dean of Middle Years or the Dean of Senior Years and we will follow up on your request.

Assessment and Assignments During Absences

Please be aware that there will be no rescheduled exams or extensions of assignment due dates for holiday purposes. We encourage you to refer to the College Assessment Policy for detailed guidance.

If your child has a legitimate reason to apply for assessment adjustment, please complete the appropriate form:

- Variation to Assessment Form (Years 7-10)
- AARA Form (Years 11 & 12)
- Request for School-Approved Absence Form

These forms must be submitted to the Student Services Building prior to the relevant due dates. All College policies and forms are available on the Parent Orbit App or Parent Lounge.
