Term I Celebrating Success Winners

Chanel College's 'Celebrating Success' positive reward system has been hugely successful during Term 1. 'Celebrating Success' acknowledges outstanding achievements of students at Chanel College. Students can earn 'Celebrating Successes' for demonstrating green level behaviours, found on page 23 of the Student Organiser. When issuing a 'Celebrating Success' staff members record the Celebrating Success in the Student Organiser (see page 140 onwards).

Once 10 'Celebrating Successes' have been accumulated, students are to hand in their Student Organiser to Assistant Principal Students, Mrs Georgia Glindon, who will issue a 'Celebrating Success' certificate. This is placed in the respective Year level draw. At the end of the Term, a student from each year level will be selected to win a \$25 gift voucher. This certificate also earns the student 5 points for their House.

Upon accumulating 20 'Celebrating Successes,' the student should again take their Student Organiser to the APS for a second 'Celebrating Success' certificate. The student is then eligible to go into a whole-school draw, where at the end of each term one student from the Middle Years and one student from Senior Years will win a \$50 gift voucher. This certificate earns the student 10 points for their House.



TEACHING & LEARNING

We have concluded another busy term at the College. Early-year nerves swiftly turned into a focus on learning, with students showcasing their new knowledge and skills in assessments in recent weeks. I commend all students for their tremendous efforts throughout the term.

The first week of Term 2 will be the first opportunity for parents and caregivers to receive feedback on their child's learning that has taken place so far this year. Parent/Teacher Interviews are booking out fast, so I encourage you to book as soon as possible via the Parent Orbit app.

NAPLAN Online

Across Week 7, Year 7 and 9 students completed the NAPLAN tests for reading, writing, numeracy, and the conventions of language. The results from NAPLAN will be shared with parents later in the year once published. The College reviews these results to reflect on the successes and areas for growth in areas such as literacy and numeracy.


We are proud of our students for giving their best across the two days, highlighting their growth as Chaneligans in being *responsible*, *resilient*, and *respectful* learners. It is this growth which is the most important measurement drawn from any testing experience. NAPLAN is a point in time gauge of academic process. The development of all aspects of the individual is continual, and our key focus here at Chanel College.

Term 2 Assessment Periods

The College's assessment policies outline the importance of students completing all assessment. The College will only reschedule examinations for reasons of illness and misadventure, so I ask that families consider assessment weeks when planning ahead.

The College has adopted a continuous learning pattern of unit delivery. This pattern means that, once assessment has concluded, the new unit of learning commences immediately. By adopting this pattern, the full years' work of learning is planned and delivered by our expert teaching team.

Grin and Tonic Drama Incursion

Drama Students in Years 9-12 recently had the privilege of attending an incursion with the Grin and Tonic Theatre Troupe. The day began with a performance by the company of "April's Fool" by David Burton.

In April 2009, two weeks short of his nineteenth birthday, Toowoomba teenager Kristjan died due to complications from illicit drug use. Using the words of Kristjan's friends and family interviewed over many months, and inspired by the journal of Kristjan's father, David Burton has dramatised a powerful story of love, loss, and sadness, with touching humour.

For the remainder of the incursion, students were immersed in the thought-provoking world of Bertolt Brecht's Epic Theatre. As part of this workshop, students engaged with a familiar narrative and then playfully subverted it through a host of different exercises including Narrative Deconstruction, Verfremdungseffekt (Alienation Technique), Gestus and Physicality and Didactic Intent.

Gear 11 Drama Excursion to Dreamtime Cultural Village

As stimulus for their FA1 Assessment, Year 11 Drama and Drama in Practice students ventured to The Dreamtime Cultural Village in Rockhampton. Students were fortunate to be hosted by Wayne, a local elder, who shared his perspectives and personal stories from the area. Wayne performed a "Welcome Song" on the Digeridoo, where the resonating sounds swirling around the cave gave a sense of peace and reflection.

Another highlight of the day was the opportunity to learn how to throw a Boomerang. Not as easy as it looked, some were more natural than others when it came to this task. On returning to school, students could use the experiences from the day as stimulus for devising their Dramatic Concepts where they shared stories from varying perspectives.

Well done Isaac on bringing men's mental health to the spotlight and for your commitment to raising awareness and funds for such a worthy cause! The Black Dog Institute is a movement of people who share the same vision of achieving a mentally healthier world. The mullet is not only a hairstyle but a catalyst for conversation surrounding mental health. Tragically, suicide is the leading cause of death for men aged 15 – 44 years in Australia. Statistics show 1 in 5 Australians experience a mental illness each year.

The funds raised from the Mullets for Mental Health Campaign go towards fast-tracking mental health research and trials, and supporting health professionals, policymakers and everyday Australians to make informed decisions about mental health. 


Gear 8 Science Specialised Cell Models
